Kate Kruse is a national leader in clinical legal education and a scholar in the areas of moral and political philosophy, jurisprudence and legal ethics. She is currently a professor of law at the William S. Boyd School of Law at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, the director of the UNLV Innocence Clinic and a visiting professor this fall at Fordham Law School.

Professor Kruse’s 20 years of clinical teaching experience include 11 years at the University of Wisconsin Law School’s Frank J. Remington Center, which serves as the primary legal service provider for Wisconsin state prison inmates, in which she developed and taught clinics in criminal appeals and prisoner family law. Professor Kruse also taught as a visiting professor in American University Washington College of Law’s Criminal Defense Clinic and for five years in UNLV Boyd School of Law’s Juvenile Justice Clinic.

Professor Kruse’s scholarship focuses on the theoretical foundations for legal ethics, particularly on lawyers’ role as client counselors. She is the secretary of the Clinical Legal Education Association (CLEA), a co-editor-in-chief of NYU School of Law’s peer-reviewed *Clinical Law Review* and a frequent presenter at national and regional clinical conferences on issues of clinical scholarship and clinical pedagogy.

The Howard Lichtenstein Distinguished Professorship was established in 1989 to remember Howard Lichtenstein, an outstanding lawyer with a genuine interest in legal education and the training and development of young lawyers. During his 44 years of practice, his primary concentration was in the field of labor law. As a senior partner at the law firm of Proskauer Rose Goetz & Mendelsohn, he was considered an authority on administrative law. In addition, Mr. Lichtenstein was a strong advocate for improving the teaching of legal ethics.
