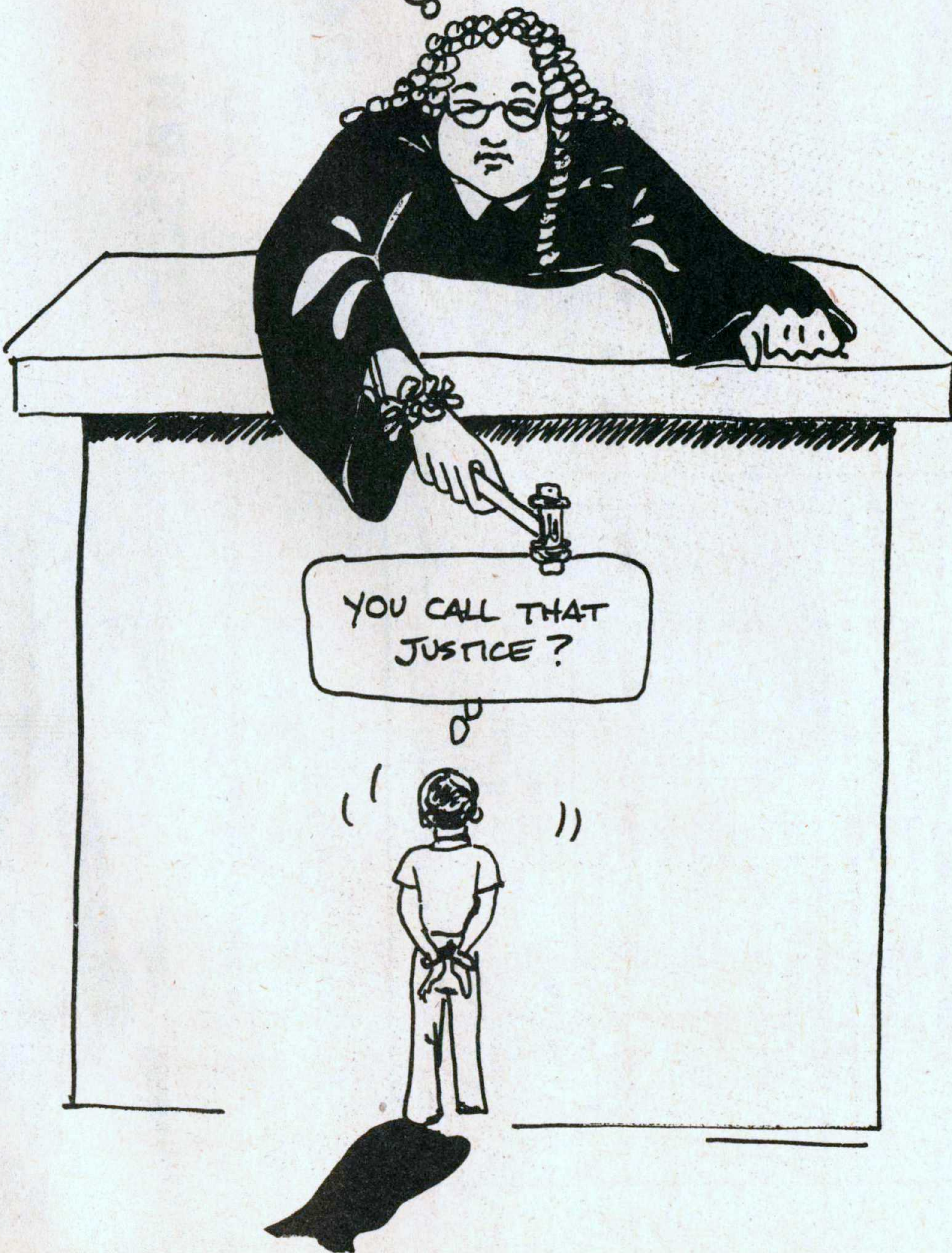

Law School Going Condo

Dean Shirts has announced the sale of the Hofstra Law School building to real estate developer Donald Chump. Chump purchased the building with the intent to convert the rooms and offices into condominium units. "The location is ideal," said Chump. "It's near a sports arena, a school, and a McDonald's."

News of the sale was met with enthusiasm from several faculty members. "These units appear to me to be a sound investment," said Professor Mitchell Gains. "I may sell my Mercedes." Professor Lawrence Wrestler has already expressed interest in purchasing the unit presently known as Room 238. "Sure, I've eyed that baby for a long time," he said. "You think it's a coincidence that all of my classes are held there?" When asked what attracted him to that room, Wrestler would only say "you're joking, right?"

Chump has promised to give professors the opportunity to purchase the units they presently use as their offices, before offering them to outside buyers. They will have 30 days to make a cash payment in full. Prices for the units range from \$400,000 (Room 227) to \$1,200,000 (the "Dean's Suite"). The penthouse (nee Room 308) may be purchased for an even one million dollars. "And that includes the exclusive use of the third floor restrooms," said developer Chump. "These prices, coupled with the demand for a cash payment in full, could cause serious liquidity problems for those of us who have been less than diligent in our financial planning," said Professor Gains. One professor, who has requested anonymity, insists that he will refuse to vacate his office when the 30 day period expires, saying, "if Moses could schlep forty years across a desert, I could stick it out here a little bit." When asked what he planned to do about such "squatters," developer Chump would only say that he has retained counsel in preparation for any necessary eviction proceedings. It has been learned that Ronald Silvermine will represent Chump and will receive a condominium unit as compensation. Silvermine has denied this, saying "what kind of a frog do you think I am?" However, a source close to Silvermine has revealed that Silvermine recently received an inter-office memo from Professor Gains, informing Silvermine that the fair market value of Silvermine's unit will be taxed to him as ordinary income. The memo sent by Gains was nearly identical to a memo he sent last year to another attorney in circumstances similar to Silvermine's.

Among the changes planned by Donald Chump is the conversion of the library

lounge into a cocktail lounge. It will be named "Le Law Lounge," which is French for "The Law Lounge." The reference desk will serve as a bar, where drinks will be served from 3 p.m. to 2 a.m., seven days a week. The library staff is expected to be retained, and will be trained as bartenders and waitresses. "I've been just waiting for the chance to show my stuff," said new bartender Gene "The Whip" Passkey. "I mix one wicked martini."

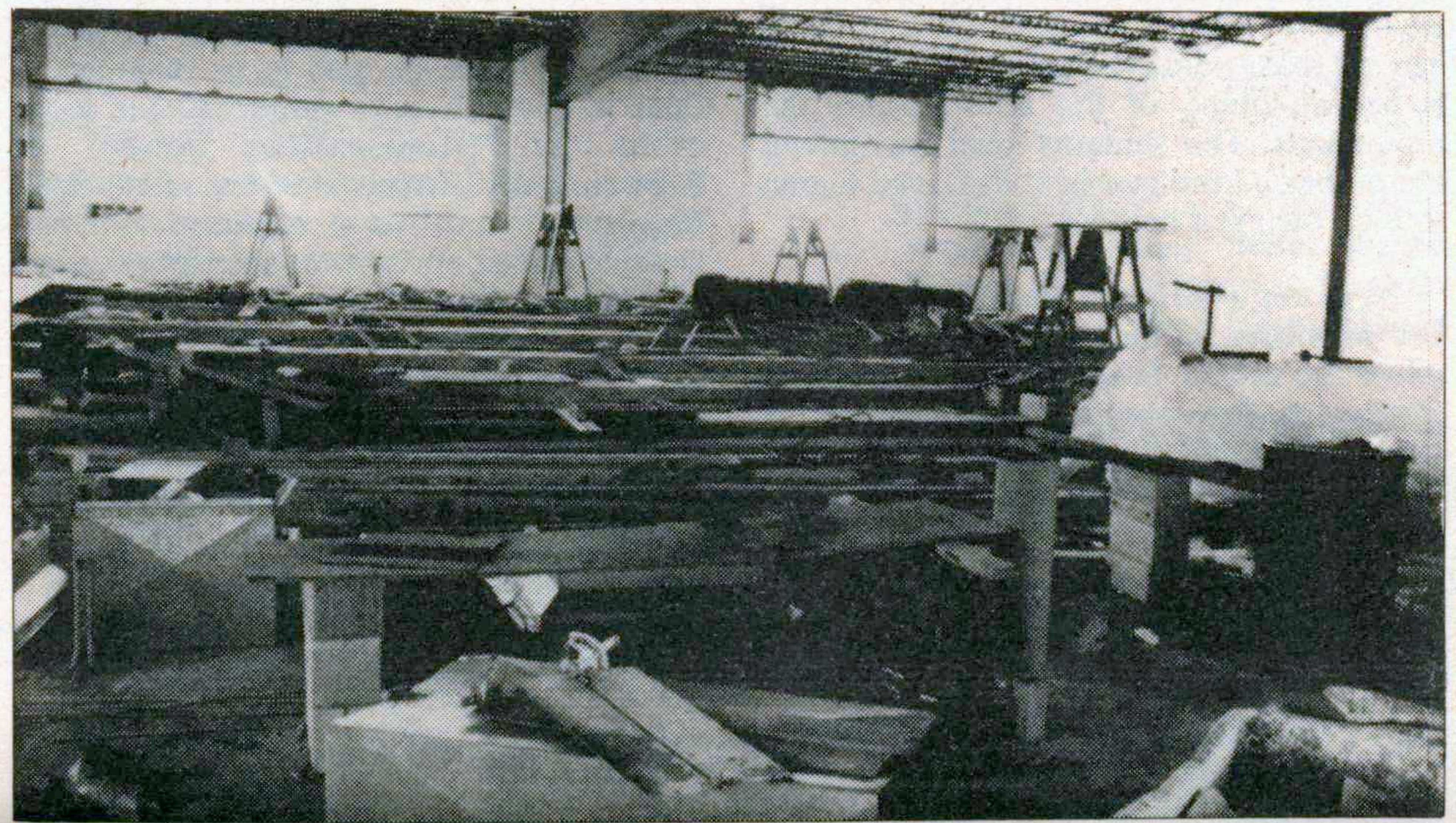
Dean Shirts has asked students for assistance in naming the building. Thus far, student interest has been minimal. The Dean has suggested naming it "The Wilson Goode Condominiums," and welcomes student response to that choice.

When asked to what location the Hofstra School of Law will relocate, Dean Shirts said "well, that is a problem. But it is one that eventually faces any national law school." A committee has been formed to assist in the search for a new location for the law school, the Committee on Relocation to Another Place. Students are encouraged to submit their suggestions to CRAP. The CRAP box is located in the Registrar's office. Dean Shirts has suggested the possible takeover of the California Avenue Elementary School, located adjacent to Hofstra's campus. Said Shirts, "The little kids can be taught by their parents. Education begins in the home anyway."

Hofstra Law students will be given the opportunity to purchase condominium units at designated times. Third year students may purchase on Thursday, April 11, between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. Second year students may buy units on Friday, April 12, between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. First year students may purchase on Friday, April 12, between 2:25 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. If a 2L or a 1L wishes to purchase a unit already requested by a 3L, the 3L will be given preference. Units marked with an "S" may not be lived in by more than two people.

The Registrar will supervise the sales of units to students. Students wishing to buy should be prepared to show three forms of identification, and will be fingerprinted. They will be frisked for weapons at the door. A note from a doctor may be beneficial. To assure that no transactions are fraudulent, the Registrar has reserved the right to insist on being presented with the cancelled checks for every tuition payment made by students during their enrollment at Hofstra. A handwriting sample may also be requested.

Law students will not be able to park in Hofstra's parking lot after the condominium units have been sold. "So things should be the same as usual," said Dean Shirts.

Deans Fight Erection in Rear of Law School

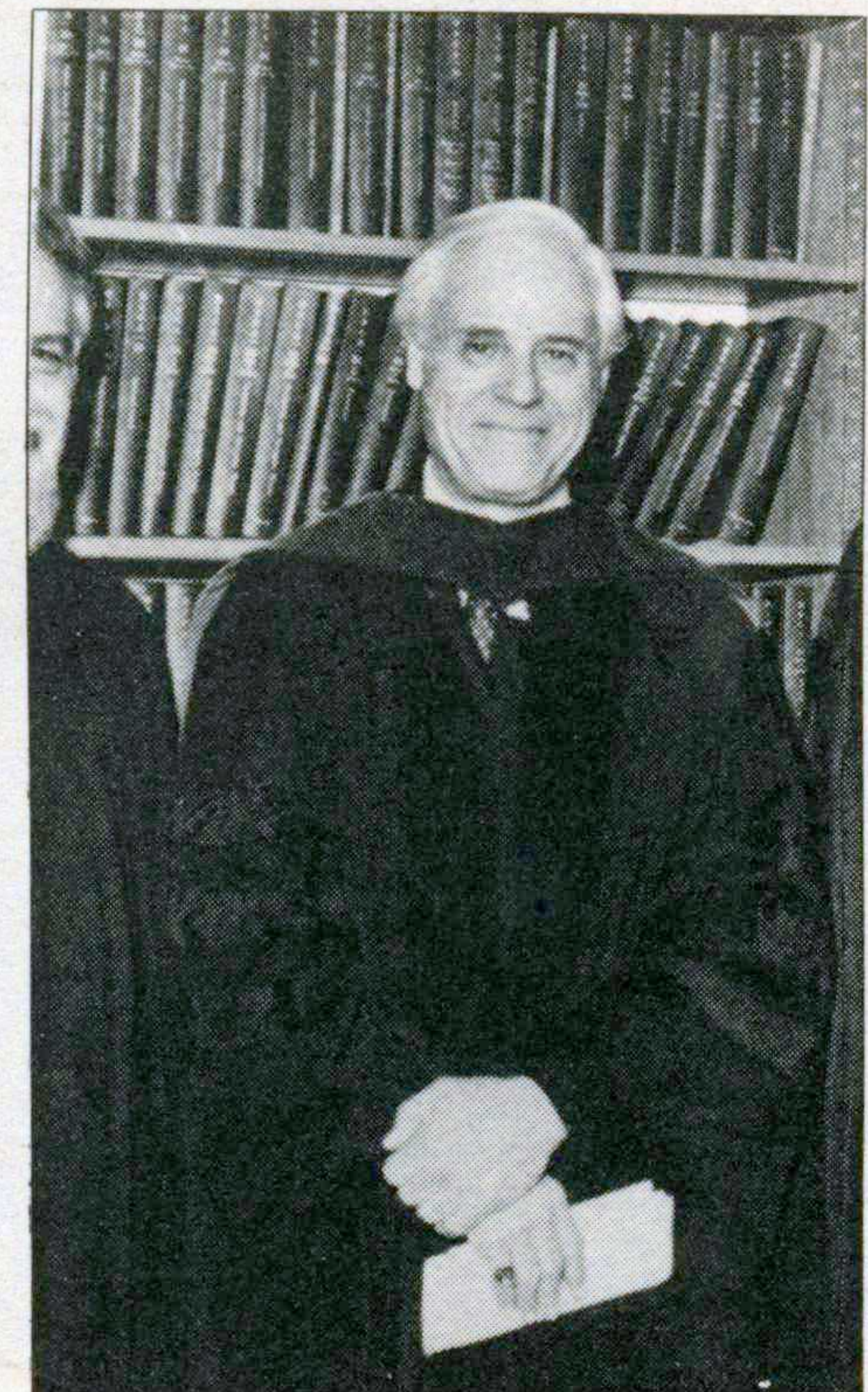

Eric J. Schmertz, Dean of Hofstra Law School, and Stuart Rabinowitz, Vice Dean of the law school, have been waging an all-out war against Hofstra University. The Deans have been fighting the construction of the University's new communications center in the rear of the law school.

The construction of the Richard E. Honen Memorial Communications Center, named after that great pioneer in the fields of Rhetoric and Communication, Norman L. Center, has long been a bone of contention between law school and University officials.

According to Dean Rabinowitz, the land upon which the communications center now sits had been promised to the law school for the construction of Bruce Z. Gittleman Memorial Law Library. This library, named after that pioneer in Legal Research, Alfred G. Library, would have replaced the hopelessly inadequate law library now relied upon by students, faculty, and practitioners. The main feature of the new library was the planned multi-level subterranean parking garage that would finally have resolved the critical shortage of parking spaces here at the law school.

Ironically, University officials maintain that the confusion as to the proper use of the space in question may be attributed to a lack of communication between Dean Schmertz and President Shuart. Apparently, Dean Schmertz mistakenly assumed that site of the new library would be in the rear of the law school. Instead, Hofstra University officials set aside some land in the front of the law school for the new library-garage. This land, however, is now the site of the new bookstore-snackshack.

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DEAN CLOSES LAW SCHOOL IN RESPONSE TO STUDENT CRITICISM

Hempstead, April 1 — Dean Eric Schmertz announced today that the Hofstra Law School would officially close its doors in response to student criticism. In a prepared statement, the soon-to-be former Dean said, "We finally looked at the quantum of negative student input and decided, 'To Hell with this.' 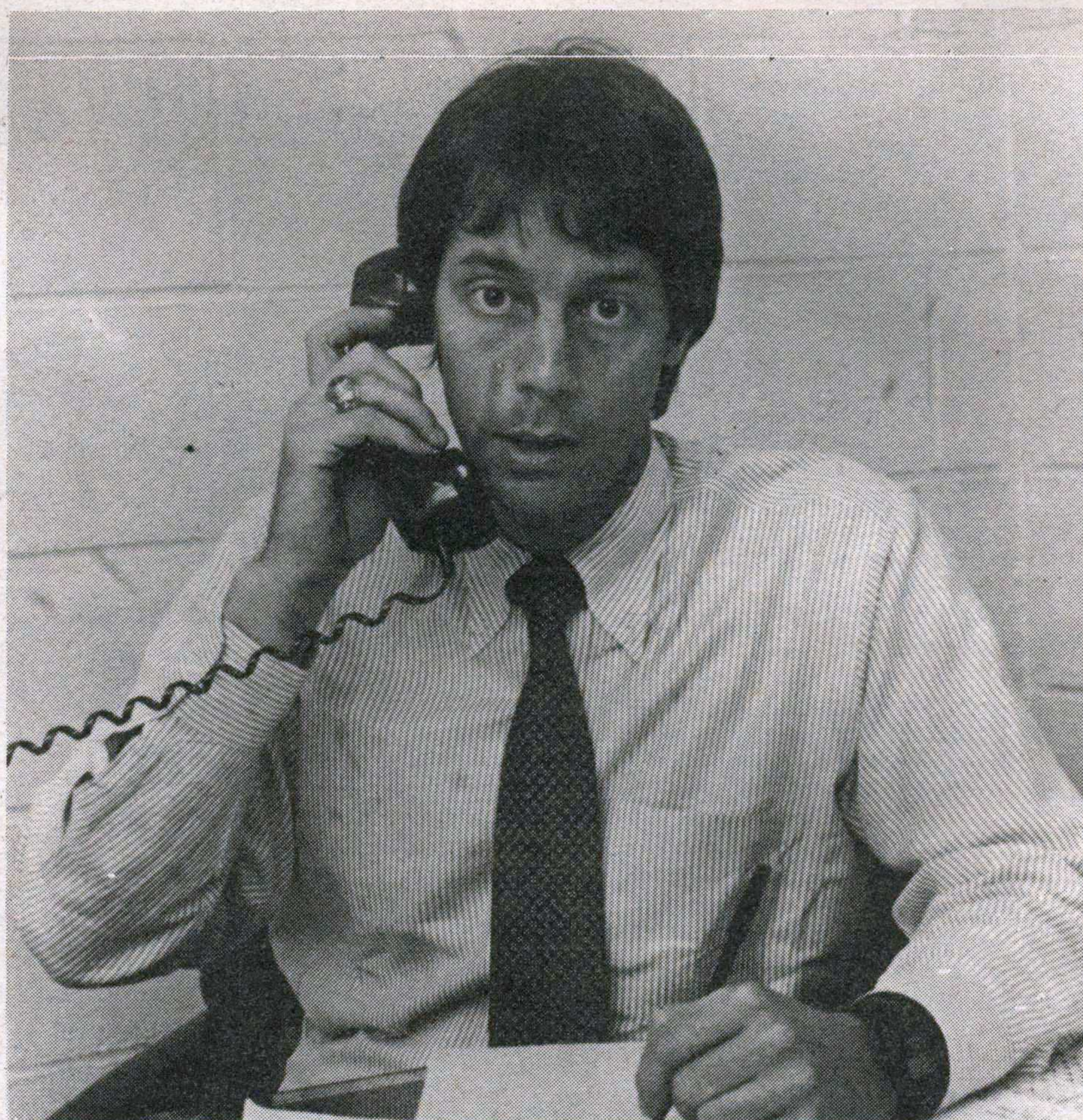
In closing, the Dean concluded his remarks saying, "You asked for it; you got it; and bye-bye Bozos!"

Anyone with any information regarding any of the events that have allegedly taken place should contact the *Guilty Conscience* office. All information will be kept confidential.

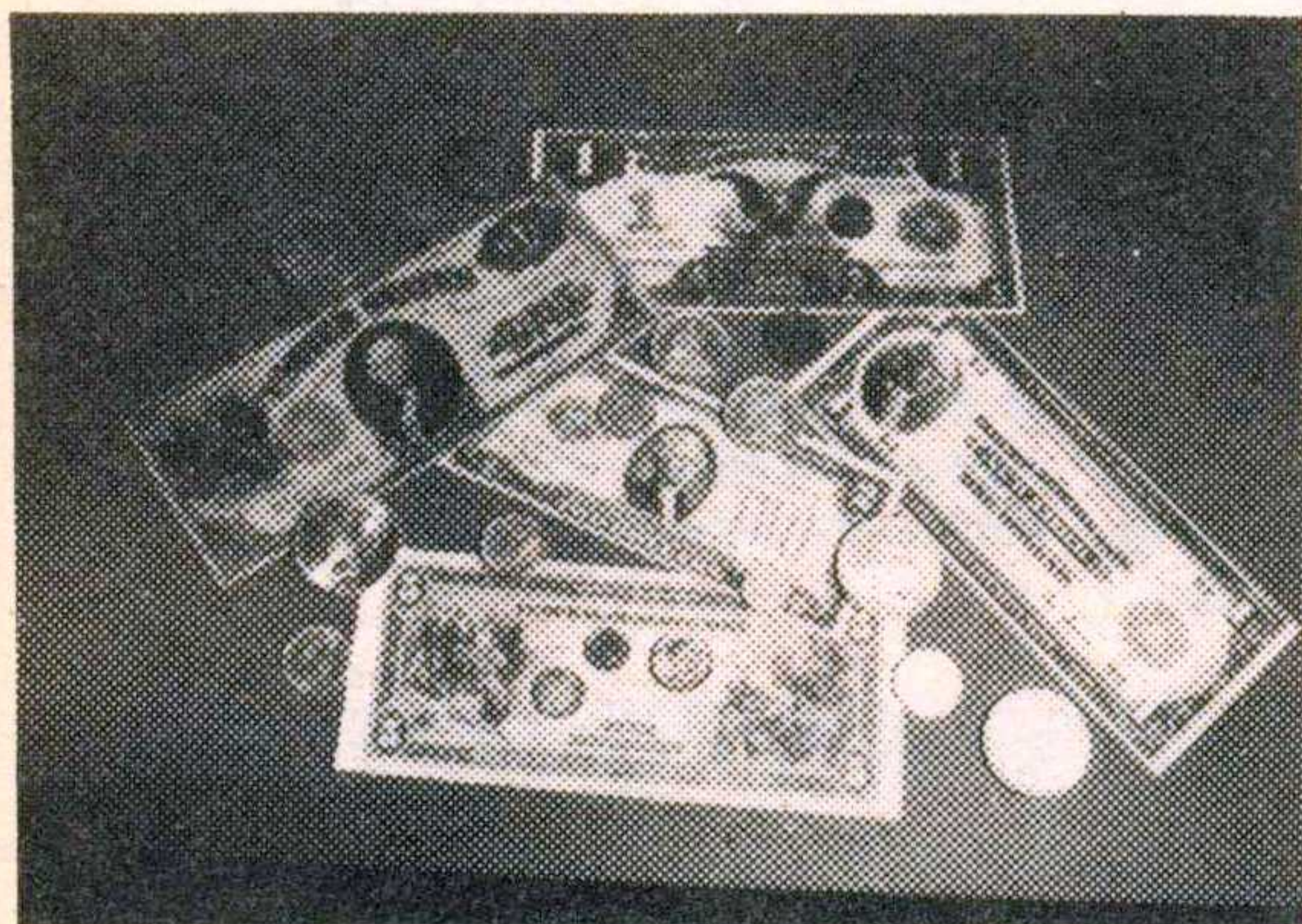

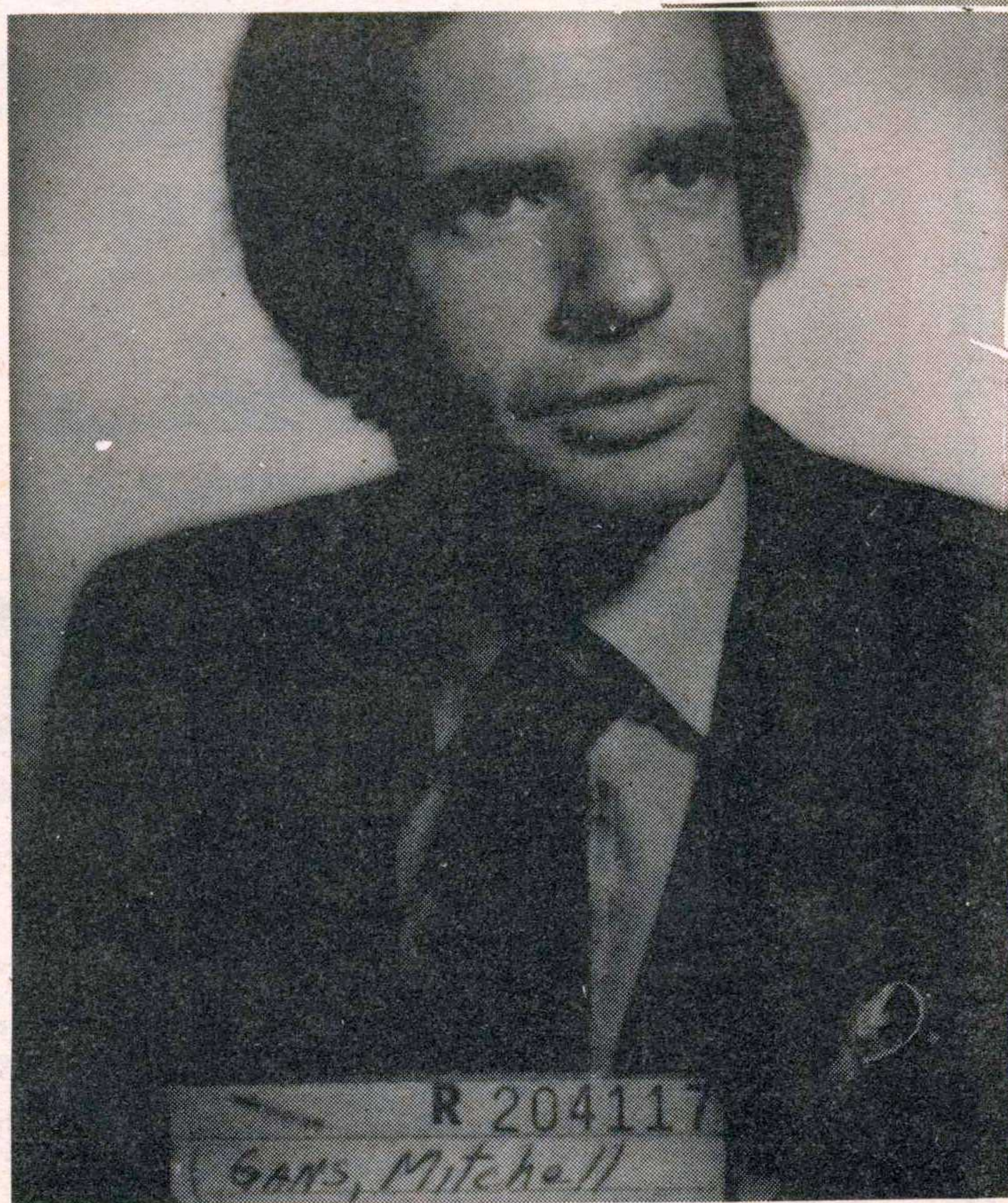

Assume they appoint a special Tenure Committee, consisting of disinterested faculty. I know, as well as you know, they're tainted. What happens?

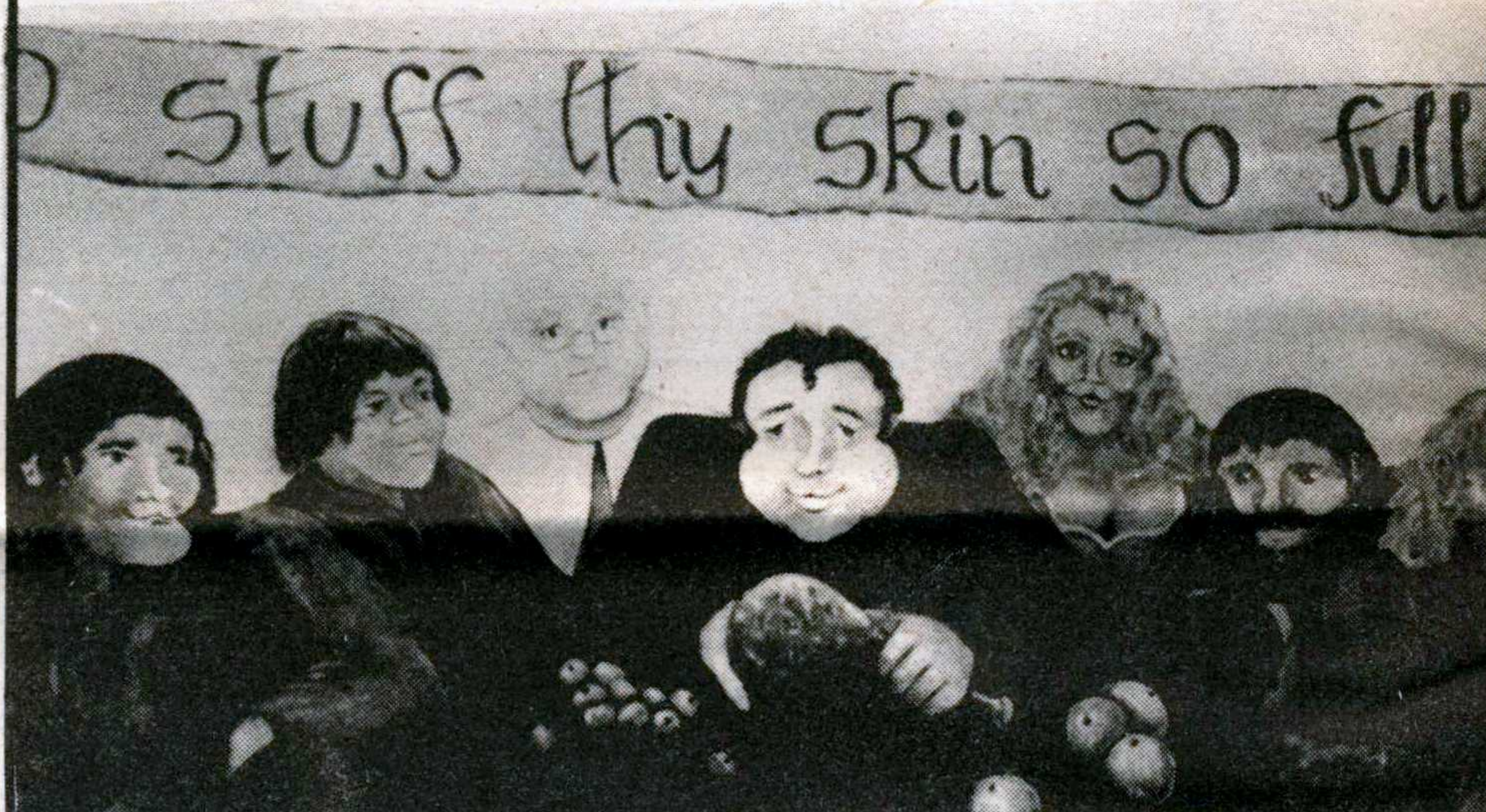

Hi kids! Thought you may be interested in what we're going to be offering next fall. This is only tentative:

EARTHWORMS AND THE LAW Mondays 4-6 pm

Prerequisite: Anthropology and the Law

This course is designed to introduce students to the intricacies of dealing with the earthworm as a client. SEX BASED DISCRIMINATION

Prerequisite: Anthropology and the Law

This course explores the ways in which the law treats men and women differently, and how to keep it that way. Consistent with Hofstra's policy of offering only courses which have a practical application in the legal community, this course analyzes the various methods of discriminating on the basis of sex and shows how to successfully engage in them without fear of government sanction. Guest lecturers include Congressman Gary Studds, on homosexuality in the workplace; Jimmy Hoffa, on the union perspective; and Professor Leon Friedman on how to avoid the due process and equal protection clauses of the 14th Amendment.

FEDERAL INCOME TAXATION OF INDIVIDUALS

Learn to legally evade taxes in your spare time. This course explores the Internal Revenue Code and its wonderful loopholes, some so big you could drive a truck through them. Professor Mitchell Gans will show you that "it is like taking candy from a baby." Copies of the final exam for this course are available at the Hofstra Book Store. Hurry, they're going fast.

ALTERNATIVES TO LITIGATION (3 Credits)

Prerequisites: Anthropology and the Law; Sex Based Discrimination

This course will examine how various

dispute handling processes operate as alternatives to judicial dispute resolution. A paper is required, and will meet the writing requirement. This course is practical in approach, and students are therefore required to observe and participate in various dispute resolution proceedings. Guest lecturers include Louis Farrakhan, on how to resolve disputes with the press; Bernard Hugo Goetz, on how to resolve financial disputes; Charlotte Hoffer, on how to resolve administrative disputes; and Professor Gans, on the methods of resolving disputes over exams. Time permitting, Professor Diamond will explore the methods of clearly framing the issue in non-judicial dispute resolution.

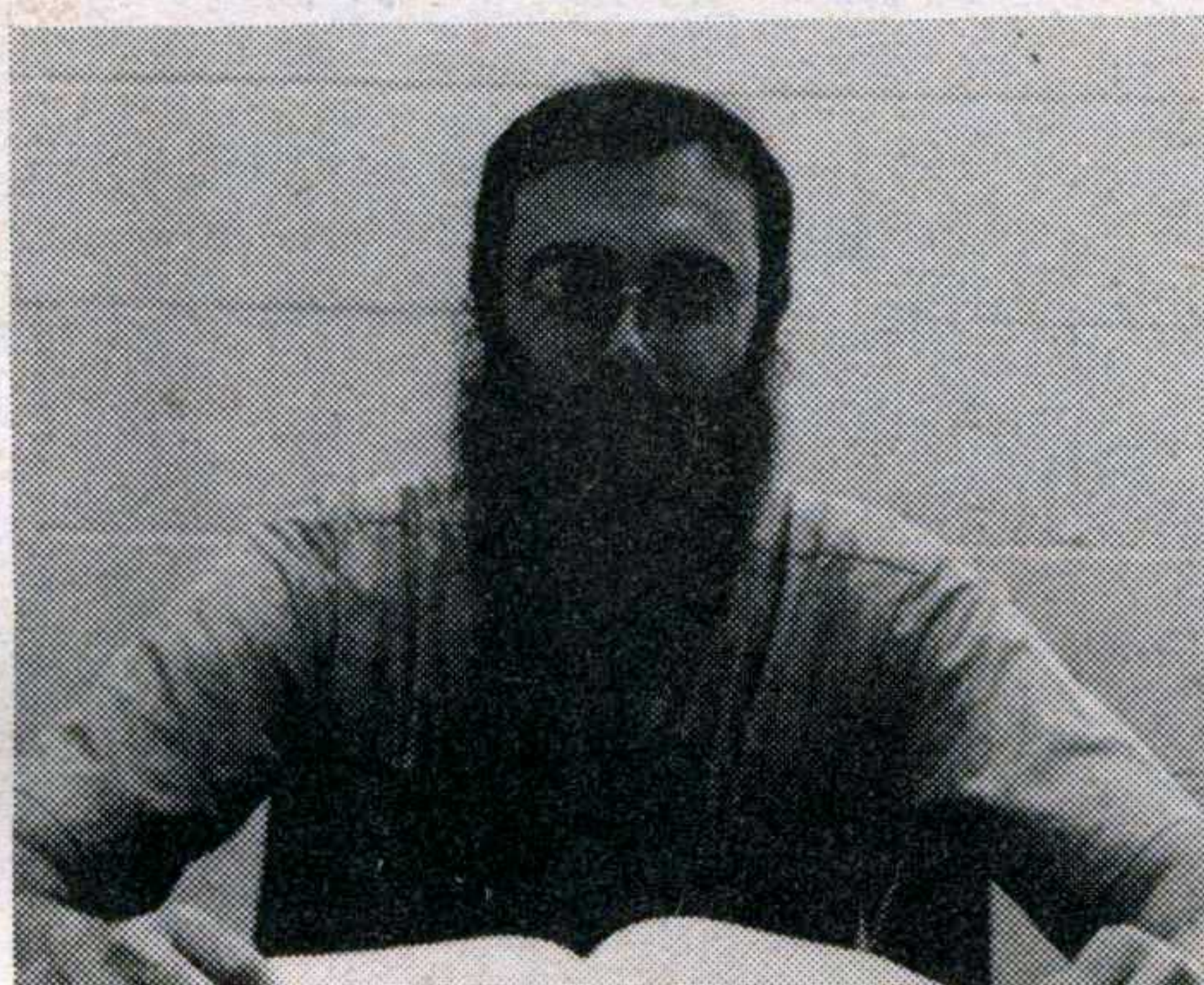
Three Hofstra Professors to take Leave of Absence

Three members of the faculty of the Hofstra Law School have announced that they will be taking some time off from their teaching responsibilities in the near future. Professors Aaron A. Twerski, Robert A. Bush, and William R. Ginsberg will all be leaving Hofstra next year to pursue various extra-legal activities.

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Guilty Conscience Forum

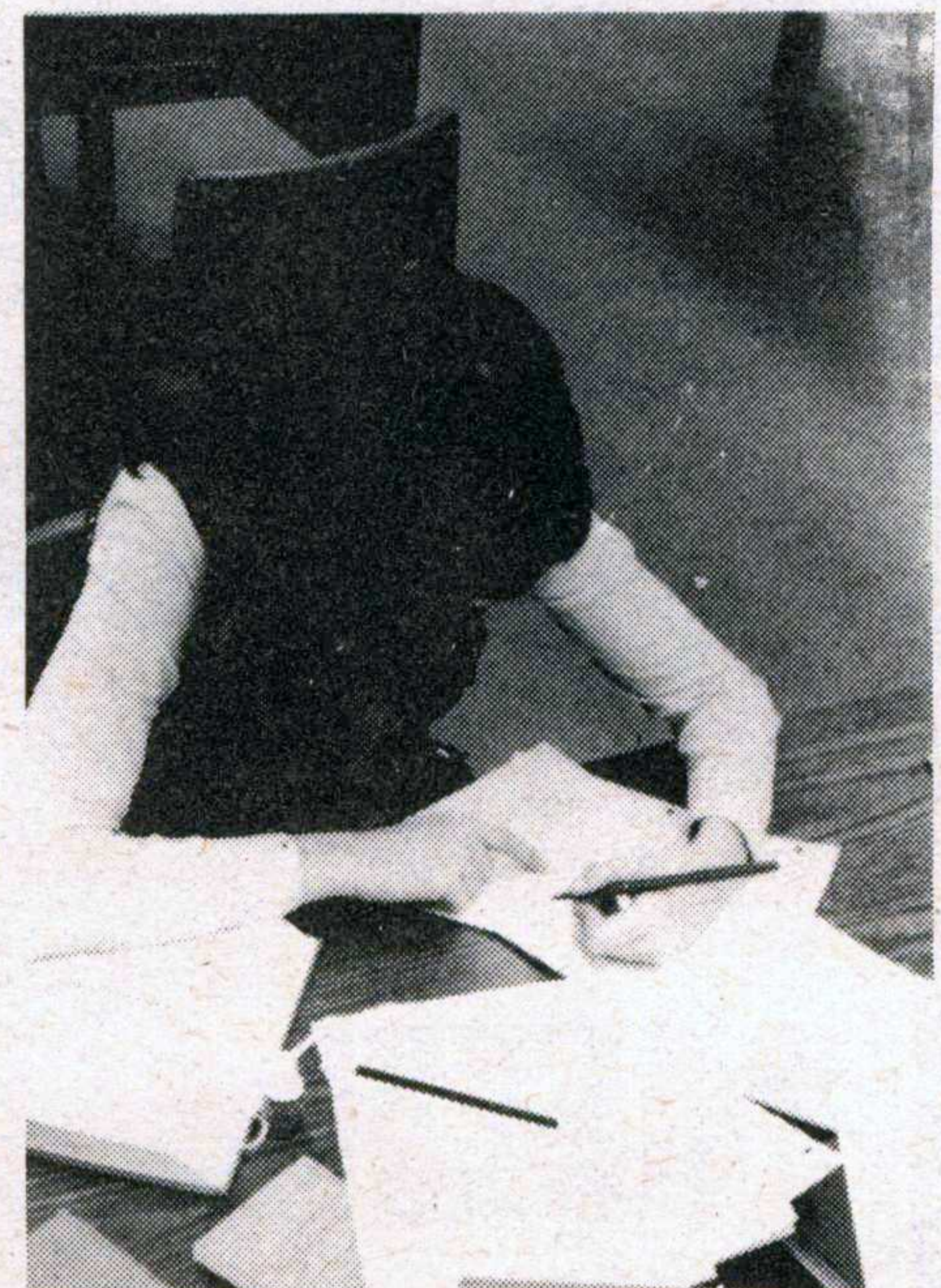
